Council Committee Highlights – April 29, 2019

The following City policy was repealed:

- 3.3.1.2. Special Transit Fares – OWLS
- The pilot project for the keeping of laying hens was extended for a further four years, with the same rules and regulations as set out in the previous pilot project. Staff will report back to Council Committee in April 2023 on the outcome of the extended pilot project. Chapter 117 of the City of Orillia Municipal Code - Licensing Appeal Tribunal was amended to reflect the authority for the Tribunal to hear any appeals related to hen coop licensing.
- Policy 1.10.5.1. - Strategic Asset Management was adopted as set out in Schedule "A" of the report.
- The City of Orillia will join the Federation of Canadian Municipalities - Local Governments for Sustainability Partners for Climate Protection Program. The By-law attached as Schedule "A" to the report will be presented to Council to appoint the Mayor and Manager of Environmental Compliance to oversee the implementation of the Partners for Climate Protection Program milestones. Staff was authorized to develop a Climate Change Action Plan, with support from the Partners for Climate Protection Program, and report back to Council.
- The report regarding the findings of the Facility Assessment conducted by the Canadian Conservation Institute on the condition of the Leacock Museum's facilities and collection was received as information. The report will be forwarded to the successful proponent for the Leacock Master Plan update.
- Staff was authorized to submit a bid to the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport to host the 2023 Ontario 55+ Winter Games.
