



Highlights from the Council Chamber

Council Committee Meeting – March 28, 2022

Below is a snapshot of what Council Committee recommended at its meeting held on Monday, March 28, 2022. Please note: The wording below does not represent the exact wording of the motion and is meant as highlights.

Please note that Council Committee recommendations are subject to Council ratification and can be pulled for discussion and change in direction at regular Council, which is scheduled for April 4, 2022.

- Further to the confidential report regarding an update on the Centennial Drive Reconstruction Phase 1 project, Option 3 was adopted.
- Staff were authorized to change the current (recreation) concession operating model to a lease agreement with a third-party vendor. Staff were authorized to enter into an agreement for the operation of indoor and outdoor concession locations.
- The report regarding the Statement of the Treasurer was received as information.
- The report regarding the 2021 Treasurer's Statement of Development Charges was received as information.
- The Wastewater System Master Plan Update from The Ainley Group was received and adopted in principle.
- Chapter 456 of the City of Orillia Municipal Code - User Fees - Parks, Recreation and Culture was amended as set out in Schedule "A" of Report BDCT-22-03.

Enquiries:

The following enquiry was postponed until April 11, 2022:

- The feasibility and costs of installing remote solar light fixtures at the Clayt French Dog Park. It was requested the report further explores the feasibility and costs of installing remote solar light fixtures or outdoor string solar lights suspended from trees along the trail from West Ridge Boulevard to Atlantis Drive.

Staff were directed to prepare a report with respect to the following:

- The feasibility of painting the four corner crosswalks located at the intersections of West and Mississaga Streets, before Canada Day 2022 or the Civic Holiday, to celebrate and honour diversity and inclusion within the community as follows:
 - Stripes of red, yellow, black and white to represent the colours of the four races
 - Stripes of violet, indigo, green, yellow, orange and red to represent the Pride flag
 - Stripes of orange to honour children who attended residential schools

- Stripes of red and white to represent all Canadians
- A maple leaf situated in the centre of the intersection

The subject report was deemed a priority and will be presented to Council Committee on May 9, 2022.
